What We Can Do

- Remedying identified safety hazards
- Improving safety in the home (such as fire prevention)
- Installing energy efficient features such as insulation, heating system repairs, and Energy Star appliances
- Age-in-place modifications including the installation of grab bars and ramps

Across the Commonwealth

This Housing & Urban Development (HUD) funded project is a rehabilitation and modification program of the primary residences of eligible veterans who have a residence in a state of interior or exterior disrepair. The program services are available across the Commonwealth of Massachusetts

Founded in 1992, **Revitalize CDC** performs critical repairs, modifications and rehabilitation on the homes and non-profit facilities of low-income families with children, the elderly, military veterans and people with disabilities.

We leverage the investments of donors, grantors and volunteers to make significant home repairs that stabilize neighborhoods, strengthen the tax base, and allows elderly homeowners to age-in-place.

Revitalize CDC has completed over 800 homes, 42 non-profit facilities, improved neighborhood parks and created community gardens with the help of 10,000 volunteers investing \$35 million into Western Massachusetts.
